Achieving optimal functional performance in a wheeled base is contingent upon multiple factors. Stable seating is one of those factors. However, stability is of no value if it ends up limiting function. Finding the balance between stability and mobility for individuals with a complex physical presentation is of vital importance in achieving success in functional activities, whether using a power or manual platform.
